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PLANNING FOR NEXT YEAR

Planning for next year, to some degree, has already begun. The creation of classes is a very important part of our yearly planning. Staff spend a great deal of time every spring preparing next year's class lists. Sometimes we are asked how decisions are made regarding the organization of our classes for the fall.

Placement of students is determined by the following criteria:

- -Student intellectual, social, emotional and physical development
- -Learning styles, strengths, and needs of students
- -Degree of independence in student work habits
- -Adhering to equitable numbers in each class throughout each grade

At times, some small groups are deliberately kept together if they form a unique group for instructional purposes. As well, we try to ensure that student characteristics such as: personality, social compatibility, and students who are positive leaders are considered for each class.

The placement of students must be determined through school based professional decisions. Teachers have the knowledge of the academic needs of students and, therefore, can best determine where individual students should be placed.

Parents are often able to provide the school with important information that can assist in the placement of students. Rather than requesting a specific teacher/class, or attempting to keep groups of friends together, parents are encouraged to advise the school of any pertinent <u>educational</u> information which could affect the placement of their child.
